

◆ New Britain. The Art League of New Britain received a \$5,000 grant funded by The 1772 Foundation for interior storm windows on their carriage house and barn. In the fall of 2020, the Trust will be using the Art League's gallery space to display the submissions of our juried barn photo contest. To find out more details, see www.cttrust.org/photoshow.



• Bristol. Connecticut Trust Circuit Riders have been helping a developer use the State Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits for the rehab of the Clarence A. Bingham School (1916) into apartments. The school was built to serve immigrant families who worked in Bristol's factories. It continued to be an elementary school until 2010 and was listed on the National Register in 2017. Features from the original classrooms exist throughout the building such as glazed brick in the hallways and tall windows and chalkboards in many of the apartments. Solar and geothermal systems were added to reduce energy consumption.

## What we've been up to in Hartford County this year.

◆ Granby/Hartford/New Britain. Maintenance & Repair grants were awarded to three churches: South Congregational in Granby, Saint Justin-Saint Michael in Hartford, and South Congregational in New Britain. The grants, totaling \$40,600, helped complete projects including steeple structural repairs, electrical system upgrades, and roof repairs. In addition to providing places of worship, these buildings are also used for various community needs including meetings, free dinners, concerts, community theater, and food pantries.



• Manchester. Trust staff has been helping with two applications for State Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits at the Hilliard Mill and Glastonbury Knitting Company Mill #3. The building at the Hilliard Mill will be reused as event space and the Glastonbury Knitting Company building will be rehabbed into senior houses.
