

What we've been up to in New Haven County this year.



• Waterbury. For the past year, Trust staff have been working with a group of concerned residents to enact a demolition delay ordinance. Provoked by the sudden demolition of the former 1883 Trinity Episcopal Church last year, the group mobilized and began working with city officials to protect Waterbury's historic resources. In October, Waterbury officially passed a demolition delay ordinance. In addition, the group is focused on forming their own historical society.

• New Haven. Negotiations over 95 and 97 Howe Street between the Attorney General (through the Connecticut Environmental Protection Act) and the developer are ongoing. Since these negotiations began, the Trust has assisted New Haven preservationists in developing new ordinances to protect all historic resources in the city in hopes of balancing economic growth and preservation.





◆ Middlebury. Circuit Riders met with the Middlebury Land Trust and representatives from the Middlebury Historical Society to discuss funding possibilities for stabilization and reuse of the Peck-Nichols House, which dates from ca. 1775. The house was slated for demolition by the Town back in 2013, but has been saved and maintained by Save Historic Middlebury.

• Cheshire/Hamden/New Haven. The Trust awarded three grants totaling \$29,726 funded by The 1772 Foundation for projects. These included funding entrance restoration at the Ball & Socket Office Building, roof replacement at the Whitneyville Cultural Commons former church building, and Phase VI window repair and restoration at the New Haven Museum.
